

ESCAPE VELOCITY:

CAN JERSEY PIONEER A ZERO-GRAVITY FINANCE INDUSTRY?

The month of October saw fierce campaigning in Jersey's first general election, and there was one question that was asked at every hustings meeting. I don't mean "Where are the exits? I was only here to pay for my dog licence" but rather "Can the candidates tell me what they propose to do to diversify our economy, free up more living space and create more jobs?" We at Gallery aren't elected (more of a benevolent media dictatorship), but now the voting is over we are able to reveal a radical proposal developed by our in-house brain trust, an idea that solves all of the Island's problems in one go and represents such a work of genius that we were certain one of the candidates would simply pinch it and take all the credit. Agriculture, tourism and the finance industry will have their place - but Jersey's future lies in becoming the first offshore jurisdiction to offer its services ... in space.

#4: The EU is currently unable to regulate financial activities outside the Earth's atmosphere


Oh those meddling EU bureaucrats, with their bossy seatbelt standards and safe




ESCAPE DEATH ADRENALIN SEEKERS

WE OFTEN HEAR THE SAYING, "CRIME DOESN'T PAY". HOWEVER SOMETIMES IT DOES, AND THESE ARE A FEW OF THE EXAMPLES WHEN CRIME NOT ONLY PAID OFF BUT PAID OFF BIG.

THE PINK PANTHERS

Are a gang of Serbian jewel thieves that is thought to consist of over 200 members. The group is responsible for some of the most glamorous robberies of all time. The gang committed their first robbery in 1993 when they stole a £500,000 diamond from a jeweller in London. The group hid the diamond in a jar of face cream, this earned them their nickname as the same act was committed in the film: "Return of the Pink Panther". Since then the Pink Panthers have successfully robbed over twenty different stores in 20 different countries. The gang is known for their daring escapes and dramatic break-ins. In St Tropez, they robbed a store dressed in flowery shirts and escaped on a speed boat. However, these high profile heists meant that several gang members have been arrested including alleged leader, Dragan Mikic. In 2005 he then escaped from prison using a rope ladder while the Pink Panthers fired machine guns at the prison wall. He has been on the run ever since. The gangs total haul is now believed to be in the billions of dollars and they have not officially been caught.

ALBERT SPAGGIARI

A french career criminal that committed the robbery of the Societe Generale in Nice. Spaggiari had been arrested once before and served in the french military but at the time of the robbery he was living a regular life as a photographer. It seemed Spaggiari was growing tired of a normal crime free life. His plan was to dig through the sewage system and access the vault in the basement of the Societe Generale. A group of professional gangsters from Marseille were hired to help Spaggiari attempt the robbery. He would not let them drink coffee or alcohol and made them get 10 hours sleep a night to make sure they did not put the robbery in danger. The gang dug the tunnel for two months and broke into the bank during the Bastille Day festival, as the

bank was closed for a long weekend. They opened over 400 safety deposit boxes and stole a total of over 60 million francs (about £7.2 million) worth of money and valuables. Spaggiari left a message on the vault wall that read "sans armes, ni maine, ni violence" in english that means "without weapons, nor hatred, nor violence". The police were baffled at first, however they got a tip off from one members former girlfriend. The man they caught then ratted out the rest of the group, including Spaggiari. During his trial, Spaggiari gave the judge a piece of encrypted evidence then jumped out of the window and escaped on a motorcycle that was left for him. Spaggiari was never caught and the money was never found.

A LUCKY MUGGER

In 1990, an unknown man held up John Goddard with a knife, a 58 year old messenger working for Shepherds, the broker. The man took Goddard's briefcase which contained a staggering £292 million in bearer bonds and England treasury bills. The man who stole the bonds got away with it and took 301 treasury bills valued at around £1million each. All the bonds were eventually recovered except for two which the mugger managed to keep. It's amazing that one of the largest robberies of all time was committed by a man with a knife.

BERTIE SMALLS

During the 1960s and 70s Bertie
Smalls was an English armed robber.
Smalls committed his first robbery at
the age of 15 and was imprisoned as a
result.From this point forward he was
committed to a life of crime. Before
1970 Smalls had a few high-profile
robberies to his name and was well
respected in the London underworld.
On the 9th February, 1970, Smalls led a
gang from the Wembley mob to rob a
Barclays Bank branch in Ilford.

The gang escaped with £237,736 a record amount at the time.

The gang escaped to different places out of England, Smalls himself boarded a train to Paris. However Smalls returned to England and gave himself up in Northampton, where he spent the Christmas period in jail. On June 2nd, Smalls asked for immunity if he gave up all those associated in the crime. The chief inspector agreed to his deal and Smalls testified against every one of his co-conspirators. Their sentence totalled up to over 100 years in prison and Bertie Smalls remained immune for the rest of his life.




ISABELLA STEWART GARDNER MUSEUM ROBBERS

A robbery in which two men stole \$500,000,000 worth of artworks, including works by Rembrandt, Vermeer, Manet and Degas. On the night of March 18th, 1990 these two men entered the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum disguised as Boston Police officers. Once inside the robbers impersonated police men, responding to a call, and handcuffed the guards. They then raided the second floor of the museum. The museum still has empty frames hanging in place as a homage to the stolen pieces and to show their hope that they may one day be returned to their rightful home. The robbers have never demanded a ransom and will never serve any time as the statute of limitations has run out. The museum has offered a \$5 million reward for any information regarding the return of the stolen paintings.

- Houdini requested that an enormous bathtub was fitted at his house so that he could practice holding his breath underwater.




SHAWSHANK HUSBAND








Domestic animals sometimes escape and survive in the wild where they are known as feral. They often cause problems as in the case of mink which escaped from fur farms from the 1930s onwards and became real pests on British waterways, certainly contributing to the decline of otters. Even escaped hamsters can be pests by chewing through electric wires. In Jersey we have feral ferrets which sometimes attack and eat chickens.

Ferrets belong to the Mustelid family which includes stoats, weasels and otters. They are often mistakenly called polecats and while they are descended from polecats they are now a separate subspecies, although some still have the brown colouration of polecats with the typical facial mask which makes them look like bandits. Most however are creamy white with pink eyes. True polecats are still found in Wales and England and there ferret-polecat crosses can occur.

There is a considerable size difference between the males, known as hobs, and the female jills. They are social animals, liking to live in groups, often in burrows. A group of ferrets is known as a business. They are banned from some countries including New Zealand and parts of Australia. In the EU, like cats and dogs, they can travel if microchipped and with a pet passport.

They were probably domesticated around 2500 years ago, maybe by the ancient Egyptians. Their main use was to catch rabbits as their long thin bodies are easily able to go down rabbit burrows. Nowadays some are trained to carry string through vents in buildings and aircraft so that cables can then be pulled through.

In the painting by Leonardo da Vinci of Lady with an Ermine, she is probably holding a ferret rather than a stoat. Similarly the Ermine painting of Elizabeth I shows her with her pet ferret. According to an old English tradition ferrets could cure whooping cough. The ferret was allowed to drink from a bowl of milk and the rest was given to the patient.

International Irlen Syndrome Awareness Week

Last month saw the first ever international Irlen Syndrome awareness week here in Jersey, this little-known condition could affect as many as one in seven islanders. Irlen Syndrome is the brain's inability to process visual information, affecting daily functioning. Regularly misdiagnosed as dyslexia, it's a problem with the brain's ability to process light. The condition can lead to headaches, restlessness and people struggling to understand what they're reading. By filtering out the offensive light waves using coloured lenses or sheets of plastic everything settles down for the reader.

Huge sectors of the population are affected although Irlen Syndrome is not yet identified by standard educational or medical tests. The launch of the awareness week was held at Pizza Express on Monday 20th October, where many of those sporting their specifically prescribed coloured lenses got together to share their stories. The week also saw visits being made to local island school assemblies and seminars were held for local business employees, all to raise awareness of the ease of correctly identifying and treating Irlen Syndrome.

50% of individuals with reading and learning difficulties, 30% of people with ADHD and autism, and approximately 15% of the general population struggle with Irlen Syndrome. Unfortunately, most of these sufferers remain unaware of the true source of their problems. Irlen Syndrome has also been linked to brain injury, chronic headaches and migraines.



Druk Yul – as the Bhutanese name their kingdom – means "Land of the Thunder Dragon" and with its mist-shrouded peaks, sacred temples and dense forests it's easy to see why. No larger than Switzerland, this predominantly Buddhist nation has been hailed as the ultimate Shangri-La. Bhutan is, after all, the land above the clouds where folk still fear the Yeti ...

Very few tourists have been to this tiny, isolated kingdom cradled high in the Himalaya's, and most people have never even heard of it. Hardly surprising when this remote realm had purposely cut itself off from the rest of the world until recently. Even now, tourism to Bhutan is limited, but it is well worth the effort and expense according to those who've been.

Bordered by Tibet on the north and India on the other three sides, Bhutan is accessible by air from a handful of Asian hubs into Paro International Airport. It's a notorious descent at the best of times, snaking along a valley between two mountains before landing at Paro's airstrip, 7000 feet above sea level and frequently beset by bad weather.

You can also arrive by road, but there are only two permitted entry/exit points for foreigners, both from India – one on the southwest side bordering West Bengal and the other to the southeast, bordering Assam.

The Bhutanese landscape is spectacular with peaks piercing the clouds before giving way to fertile valleys far below. Mysterious temples and ancient forts dot the countryside, with virgin forest covering three quarters of the land. The Himalayan air is so fresh that lichens grow unchecked and one species hangs down like a delicate fringe from the trees.

Colourful prayer flags flutter like bunting in the breeze and wooden prayer wheels come in all sizes but are always turned clockwise. "It's a bit like mass producing prayers!" quips writer Moz Scott, who recently returned from a five-day trek in Bhutan with her friend, Beverley Pasqua.

Here you won't find the swarms of trekkers that trample neighbouring Nepal though, nor any budget backpackers. Why not? Because only organised tours are allowed in Bhutan and there's a hefty tourist tax of \$250 per day, which helps subsidise the country's shiny new infrastructure.



Since the fourth generation king took over in 1972, there's free education for all so literacy rates are high and poverty levels have improved dramatically. And the economy is now thriving with hydroelectricity as the main industry.

Before the 1960s, however, there was no electricity at all - nor any roads, transport, postal services or telephones. More surprisingly, there wasn't even any TV in the country before 1999! But now that westernisation is slowly creeping in, ancient traditions are gradually being eroded.

Today, educated youngsters prefer whitecollar careers over the traditional roles of their ancestors. With English as a second language, kids are now mimicking the latest songs from their pop idols in the USA, which no amount of television censorship can prevent.

Some traditions still remain, however. Friendly Buddhist monks draped in their bright saffron-coloured robes often mingle with the public and are hotshots at darts and the national sport of archery – achieving impressive accuracy over long distances.

Homemade handicrafts are sold at craft markets and three generations often share a simple wooden home on the hillside. Vegetables are all farmed organically.

The Bhutanese traditional dress is still worn by many, with men in knee-length kimonolike robes plus shoes (and long socks in winter) and women wearing sarongs under brocade jackets – similar to smoking jackets.

Everyone loves to dress up and revel in the many festivals for which Bhutan is renowned. Some of these festivals date back to the Middle Ages and attract locals from far and wide. It's a great opportunity for socialising. Among them are the popular Tshechu festivals (pronounced "ter-shu") which are joyous celebrations over several days, with colourful costumes and music and dancing – and tourists still very much in the minority.

"BEFORE THE 1960S, HOWEVER, THERE WAS NO ELECTRICITY AT ALL - NOR ANY ROADS, TRANSPORT, POSTAL SERVICES OR TELEPHONES. MORE SURPRISINGLY, THERE WASN'T EVEN ANY TV IN THE COUNTRY BEFORE 1999! BUT NOW THAT WESTERNISATION IS SLOWLY CREEPING IN, ANCIENT TRADITIONS ARE GRAUDALLY BEING ERODED."

But no trip to Bhutan is complete without a visit to the famous Taktsang (Tiger's Nest) Monastery which clings to a cliff face high above a valley and is only accessible on foot. It's a strenuous four-hour round trip pilgrimage to this sacred site. The monastery was built in 1692 on the site of a cave where an 8th century Guru Rinpoche ensconced himself and proceeded to meditate for three years, three months and three days, following a flight from Tibet on the back of a tigress to subdue a local demon.

Various hiking opportunities are a major attraction for tourists, from one-day treks into the remote valley of Bumthang, to high-altitude treks including the one from Paro to the capital city of Thimpu (pronounced Tim-poo) as undertaken by Moz and Beverley, and there are even longer ones if you wish.

There is also one of the most challenging treks in the world: the month-long Snowman Trek. It is led by experienced Alpine guides and follows the Bhutan-Tibet border over some very remote mountain passes before ending up in central Bhutan. Along the way, you might be lucky enough to spot a snow leopard, some rare blue sheep ... or maybe even a Yeti.

A Resort of Olympic Standards **WHISTLER, CANADA**

Located in British Columbia, not only does Whistler have some of the most insane off piste runs on the continent it also has many great restaurants and bars in the large village below. You may remember Whistler as host to the 2010 winter Olympics. There is a great variety of slopes that make for many enjoyable rides. Vancouver, one of Canada's most amazing cities, is within driving distance if you need a break from the mountain lifestyle. You can even enjoy the Whistler film festival over five days starting on the first week in December. If you want to see the greatest Whistler has to offer then it is a good idea to hire a guide. Once you've conquered what the slopes have to offer, you may wish to ramp up the excitement and try heli-skiing which is very popular in the region. The British Columbia is the most popular area for heliskiing in the world. When on a helicopter you can gain access to some of the best areas that Whistler has to offer.



The steam baths are an amazing way to relax after a hard days ski. However if you think you are up for it you can enjoy night skiing. Some runs in Niseko are lit up at night and the lifts are active until 9pm. You can gain a truly different perspective at night and it shouldn't be missed.. The food is fantastic and the locals are friendly. Also if there are not enough activities in Niseko then you can take seven minute drive to Kutchan which is a slightly more urbanised environment.

Swiss Serenity ANDERMATT, SWITZERLAND

Switzerland is well renowned for its ski heritage and Andermatt is no different. Andermatt is a very scenic town that looks like a typical Swiss village. Not only will you enjoy the great off piste runs but Andermatt also offers a variety of delicious Swiss cuisine such as fondue, rosti and traditional meats and cheeses. This great rural mountain food really gets you in the spirit of the Swiss culture and it's perfect ski fuel. The powder here is amazing and easy to reach via cable cars. The resort is also being improved as new facilities are being built, such as new hotels and golf courses. The runs are all fairly peaceful and you will be carving your own fresh tracks. The highlight of the resort is the Gemsstock. This fantastic summit has plenty of enjoyable off piste runs ranging from beginner to intermediate.

Chamonix used to have problems with large queues, however they have drastically improved the lift system meaning you won't have to wait long to get back to the top. Chamonix has a great town with a fun après ski scene. With a variety of enjoyable activities including a 10 pin bowling alley and a three screen cinema so you won't just be thinking about getting back to the slopes. Chamonix has some incredible views of mountain summits including Mont Blanc, the highest mountain in Europe.

If you want to ski hard and party hard then St Anton is the place for you. The village can be expensive but the après ski is great. The runs are long and expansive and the powder is great. If you want to experience the best this resort has to offer then you should definitely consider hiring a guide, so you can safely traverse some of the coolest runs in Austria. A big draw of St Anton is the bars, with a large variety you are sure to find somewhere that appeals to you. Keep in mind these slopes don't suit beginners so if you aren't a very confident skier you may want to consider somewhere else. However if you have some experience in skiing and want to experience a great nightlife then this is one to consider.

Why made you choose to escape Jersey?

As a filmmaker, there wasn't really a great deal of opportunity for me in the Island. I came to New York to really try and push myself and my skills, and in just a few years I've co-produced a Beyonce music video and shot two feature films. The first of which won "Best Thriller Feature" at the Manhattan Film Festival earlier this year, so it feels like it's been a good move!

You're based in New York, do you spend all your time there?

Pretty much, I do travel for work, but when I'm not working there's nothing I love more than wondering the streets of the Lower East Side of Manhattan, taking in all the bohemian stores and coffees shops and art galleries. The diversity of art and culture down here is still mesmerising to me.

Where do you live in the city?

Lower East Side of Manhattan... Or the LES to the locals!

What is your favourite thing about working stateside?

Positive energy, it sounds cliche but I really feel it in New York, people listen to your ideas and ambitions and always have an encouraging attitude. I love that about the place and to be honest I felt that was stronger here than in say London, which would have been my second option as a filmmaker.

Where would you recommend for Jerseyites that head there on holiday?

AVOID TIMES SQUARE! All New Yorkers I know roll their eyes at the thought of having to navigate the tourist trap that is Times Square. Find a hotel downtown, there's much more to do and you'll see the real New York City. (And if you really must visit Times Square do it whilst sipping a cocktail from the Renaissance Hotel lounge, which has spectacular views over the lights, with none of the hassle!)

What do you miss about living in Jersey?

I think this would be a common answer but family, friends and then the beach! (Oh and mountain biking with my buddies!)

What would make you want to move back?

That's a tough question, I don't ever see a substantial film industry being viable in Jersey so it wouldn't be for work. Having a family may make me consider it as again Jersey is a wonderful place to grow up.

Secondly having such a great healthcare system is really compelling, I never appreciated it until I've lived somewhere that frankly feels like a third world country when it comes to not providing adequate healthcare for its citizens unless you can afford it. Roland Topf is the USA country director for Rekorderlig Cider. After the success of Rekorderlig in the Channel Islands, the company wanted to expand. So Roland was appointed as the marketing manager under the parent company Chilli marketing.

What made you choose to escape Jersey?

I have always loved travelling and lived in the States for a few years back in the 90's. Then in early 2012 the most amazing job offer came along to carry on doing what I love and take an unknown brand to the shores of the United States. Rekorderlig cider has become a great success story in the islands and now we are trying to do the same over here, it's just thousands of times bigger and a whole lot harder but it's an incredible journey.

You're based in New York, do you spend all your time there?

No, far from it. NY is amazing and it really is growing on me but my job requires me to travel substantially especially in the first few years whilst we are sowing the seeds around the country for future success. I am probably here half of the time and in our other territories or setting up new ones for the rest of it.

Where do you live in the city?

I live in the hipster capital of New York which is a place called Williamsburg in Brooklyn, which is now apparently super cool but I don't totally fit in as I don't have at least 20 tattoos or a beard!

What is your favourite thing about working stateside?

The adventure! Seeing new places, meeting new people and watching the Americans expressions when they try Rekorderlig for the first time as cider (or 'hard' cider as they call it here) is a new category in the US but it's the fastest growing one in the drinks business.

Where would you recommend for Jerseyites that head there on holiday?

There is so much to do but aside from the usuals of Statue of Liberty and Empire State why not take a helicopter tour at night around the city? I've not done it but I've heard it's fantastic, also come over at Christmas and go skating at Bryant Park. During the summer taking a walk along the high line walkway on the West Side is great. For nightlife I don't even know where to start but Jonathans Saturday brunch at Bagatelle is crazy so I always take my guests there.

What do you miss about living in jersey?

Family, friends, kite surfing and mountain biking and those amazing beaches and just being able to go out and bump into loads of people you know.

TWO JERSEY HERITAGE MUSEUMS RECEIVE NATIONAL RECOGNITION

Two Jersey Heritage visitor sites have been awarded national accolades. Jersey Museum, Art Gallery & Merchant House and the Maritime Museum & Occupation Tapestry Gallery have received a Visit England Best Told Story Accolade.

The awards have been made for the high standard of interpretation at the museums which are considered to rank alongside other recipients including the refurbished Cutty Sark, the National Space Centre and the Museum of London. There are only 14 Best Story Accolades out of over 800 participating attractions.

The recognition follows a programme of investment in the interpretation of the sites agreed between Jersey Heritage and Education, Sport and Culture. New exhibits recognised at Jersey Museum include the Story of Jersey film told by Islanders, the new audio visual story presentations of No9 Pier Road (The Merchant House) and the living exhibition centred around the Celtic Coin Hoard, discovered in 2012. At the Maritime Museum, Islanders have helped make a knitted and crocheted underwater reef and artists have begun installing works exploring local maritime cuisine and beach life.




LOVE THEATRE
















For me art has always been, to some degree, a form of escape. When I am working on a project I get totally absorbed. I can lose myself in what I am doing to the point where I ignore someone that speaks to me; not because I am being rude, but because I am just unaware of everything else but the work I am doing. Time also tends to run away with me for the same reason.

Artwork can also be a form of escape for the audience. To an extent it doesn't matter what I was thinking when the art was produced. Once exhibited, it is the viewer's perspective that matters. I work in a contemplative way which involves a lot of looking and reflecting. In my finished work the more that you look, the more that you will see. I hope that it inspires a sense of contemplation and reflection in others.

All this said, the subject matter is not about escaping from the realities of the world. It is largely about my response to and often the awe that I feel when observing the natural environment. Wherever I go I find interest and beauty in the constantly changing visual environment in which we live. The light, the time of year, the time of day and the weather all create their individual impression on the landscape. I find constant inspiration in these changes. Through my paintings and textiles I want others to see the joy I have found in observing the world around me. I want to give a sense of the beauty around us and to emphasise the importance of looking after our world-not escaping from it.

Having been asked to provide some words on the subject "Art is a form of Escape", I find myself unable to agree with this statement.

"Art" is not an escape it is who and what you are, and you cannot escape from yourself. Art in its many forms is as important to me as eating, in fact, at times more so.

I have always loved to draw, as a child a pencil and a sheet of paper or colouring book were all that were needed to keep me quiet. Colouring inside the lines required great concentration, as did copying pictures from books. Trying to colour something smoothly without pencil lines showing was an achievement in itself. Painting came later Watercolours have a mind of their own, but are so rewarding when you get it right, and are my favourite medium.

For many years I produced very detailed pen drawings with watercolour washes, now I use oils, acrylics, pastels or whatever suits the subject or my mood at the time, as I try to transfer the ideas in my head onto the canvas or paper. But whatever the medium or subject, art has been a central theme to my life.

No, art is not an escape, it is an inescapable way of life, and those of us caught in its spell would not have it any other way.



HOW BRILLIANT AT BRUSHING ARE YOU?

Type #stupidhygienist into Twitter and there are some less than complimentary, slash, unhelpful results about patient experience with hygienists. Instead of a patronising lecture on how to brush properly why not take Katie's guiz to find out how brilliant you are at brushing?

What kind of a Brusher are You?

The Lumberjack Brusher

Brushing as if you are sawing wood can cause gums to recede and could damage tooth structure. Teeth and gums are delicate living structures, which is why we guarantee gentle hygiene care.

Katie's Tip: Use a gentle circular motion with your brush starting on the gum line and then move onto the teeth.

The Rusher Brusher

Katie tells us that most people do not spend enough time on their teeth each day. Brushing less than two minutes twice a day will not effectively remove cavity-causing bacteria.

Katie's Tip: Brush for 2 minutes twice a day. If you do not have a toothbrush with a timer on it then use your smart phone. Get your kids to brush along with you. It's all about good habits.

The Grumpy Brusher

Some people are a little too vigorous as they think brushing firmly removes strains and bacteria, but in fact this can cause permanent damage. Be gentler with your smile.

Katie's Tip: Only use brushes with a medium textured small head and be GENTLE. If your brush bristles bend when you brush then you are too angry when you are brushing.

The Sloppy Brusher

Understandably people hold their brush perpendicular to their teeth however doing this can damage gums with a brush angled at 90 degrees from your gumline.

Katie's Tip: Hold the brush at a 45 degree angle pointing into the gumline and use a gentle circular motion.

The Mucky Brusher

Not only are old toothbrushes ineffective, they harbor harmful bacteria that can cause infection like gingivitis and periodontitis (full blown gum disease).

Katie's Tip: Replace your brush regularly (about every 3 months) and make sure you swap your brush before the bristles look splayed and frayed. Always replace if you have been ill - but visiting your dentist and hygienist regularly will be a reminder to change your brush or your brush head.

The Brilliant Brusher

You deserve a halo and the fabulous smile you have. You clean regularly and properly as well as floss - brushing the surface only cleans a third of the tooth. You attend your dentist and hygienist appointments regularly and follow our advice. So much cheaper in the long run!

I certainly understand how a glass of wine in the evening can help one unwind from those daily stressful workloads. Although, rather than just pouring a glass and turning your concentration to the television, why not let that glass of wine allow you to escape in a different way?

Its not only the alcohol that helps you unwind and escape from that daily buzz. The very story behind the juice has the ability to transport you to another part of the world. There are vineyards out there with scenery that will blow your mind and leave you with that 'end of holiday' feeling when it's time to leave.

So, with that in mind why not let wine take you away from your sofa, escape to another country and experience another culture.

Here are a few wines that can help you escape for a brief moment:

Jansz Premium Sparkling Cuvee Rosé NV

From the cool climes of Tasmania this sparkling rosé is as stunning as the landscape it is produced. The vineyard lies in the Tamar Valley in the heart of the Pipers River region in north eastern Tasmania. Jansz was Tasmania's first sparkling wine to be made according to the traditional method champenoise, now describing the JANSZ technique used in creating each of their wines as Methode Tasmanoise.

Picpoul de Pinet Prestige Domaine La Grangette 2013

The southern equivalent of Muscadet, perhaps. Located in the beautiful south of France just north of Sète on the Mediterranean coast this refreshing white wine is becoming a more regular sight on wine lists. Moreover, this part of France is far removed from the rest of the country, a must see if you are passing through.

AA Badenhorst Family Blend 2010

Swartland South Africa

Now I would be lying if I said I've been here, but I'd be telling the absolute truth if I said I will visit as soon as possible. If only to meet Adi, the awesome 'dude' behind this wine. I call him a naturalist. Not sure that's the right word but nevertheless he applies this mindset to his winemaking with minimal sulphur and sustainable farming in a landscape as naturally beautiful as they come.

EVER WONDERED WHAT IT'S LIKE TO BE A CHEF IN A THREE MICHELIN STAR KITCHEN WHEN THE HEAT IS ON? NOW IMAGINE TAKING IT UP A NOTCH AND ADDING A LARGE HELPING OF HIGH-OCTANE ADRENALINE AS THE TOP CHEF FOR FORMULA ONE, TRAVELLING THE GLOBE AND COOKING FOR CHAMPIONSHIP RACING DRIVERS AND HOLLYWOOD ROYALTY. WELCOME TO THE WORLD OF FABRIZIO TANFANI.

As career trajectories go, Fabrizio's stratospheric rise from chef school on the island of Elba to Florence's three Michelin star restaurant, Enoteca Pinchiorri and then onto Hilton resorts in New York, LA and San Francisco is already impressive. And when Fabrizio returned to his home town of Piombino to open his own restaurant, the Osteria Peccato, you might have expected the story to stop there. Then came a call, inviting him to Barcelona to cook for a special event. It turned out to be an 'interview' to become Benetton's executive chef travelling with the Formula 1 team, and on his first day, Fabrizio cooked dinner for 75 Russian VIPs and Fernando Alonso and his family. How did it feel? 'Can you imagine, here I was inside this amazing circus with all my heroes, Jarno Trulli the Italian racing driver, and Fernando Alonso. It was incredible. Beyond words.'

Flavio Briatore must have been just as impressed, as Fabrizio was immediately hired as the resident executive chef. travelling with the Formula One team as well as overseeing the GP2 and GP3 series kitchens, feeding over 500 for lunch and 400 for dinner through the season. 20 races, and 15 or 16 tests across the world from Abu Dhabi to Australia. Logistically that must have been quite a challenge. 'Of course. It was a lot of work to source ingredients for a different menu each day in each country. But it's very inspiring too. You're essentially creating new dishes incorporating the spices, seasoning and ingredients of each country. Local food is so important, and you pick up the flavour profiles at each location you visit. One of my favourite places to cook was Japan, not only for the fresh flavours but also their knife skills of the local team - they were ninjas with knives!'

It might be a coincidence that in the year he joined the Benetton F1 team as its executive chef, Fernando Alonso won the World Championships, but we like to think it had quite a lot to do with Fabrizio's cooking. What was Fernando Alonso's favourite

meal? 'Steak on the grill and pasta with tomato sauce. Simple but just perfect for him. He would come and hide out in the kitchen sometimes - racing is a sport which is very demanding and there were always journalists around, but in the kitchen he could be himself. Often when the drivers are at a loose end they come into the kitchen because they like the atmosphere and they can just be relaxed.'

It wasn't just famous racing drivers in Fabrizio's kitchen. 'One of my best memories is cooking for Michael Douglas. He was my idol ever since Basic Instinct with Sharon Stone, so it was amazing to meet him myself. He asked for seafood pasta, so I made him an artisan calamarata pasta with razor fish, fresh tomato, saffron and lemon zest. And then a dish from my book, tuna tartare with avocado and melon seasoned with Persian blue salt.' And then there was the time in Budapest that Fabrizio cooked for James Cameron and the cast of Avatar and didn't even realise... 'I only

found out later when I was in the disco at the F1 party and realised it was the Avatar actor, Sam Worthington. I didn't recognise him - lots of famous Hollywood actors are quite short in real life.'

Fabrizio even found time to squeeze in a season as the chef for Flavio Briatori's superyacht, where dinner guests included Naomi Campbell, Kate Moss and Heidi Klum (well you would, wouldn't you) as well as writing his own cookery book full of his recipes from the Formula One circuit, 'Miles and Meals' for Pirelli and having a steak cook-off at the book-launch in Montecarlo with Jenson Button and Romain Grosjean. Who won? 'Jenson wasn't bad, he had a good wrist action on the pan, but Romain Grosjean was the better cook. They cooked fillet steak with pepper sauce, and the secret is to have the pan and the olive oil very hot so it seals the meat without burning. Never cook it too much!'

After eight years with Formula One's Benetton and then Pirelli team, these days Fabrizio is working for The Calvani Group as their executive chef developing the exciting new Terminal GBJ project where he will oversee the kitchen. You'll also find

him at La Cantina where he's launching a new a la carte menu this month alongside the restaurant's classic pizza and pasta dishes. Think dishes that owe their heritage to Italian tradition and taste but created with hyper-local ingredients. So carbonara with home-cured pig cheek & eggs from Potage Farm, burrata mozzarella made from Jersey milk, artisan fresh pasta, 30-day aged Jersey beef, local smoothhound shark meatballs, whole pig salami and Jersey honey pannacotta.

It's modern high-end local eating at La Cantina but with a classic laid-back Italian approach. Choose smaller dishes which give you the ability to eat a progression of courses in a traditional Italian way, or just stop for a fantastic plate of artisan pasta and a glass of imported Italian wine. You might even get a chance to try a few of Flavio Briatori's favourite dishes...

Who would play you in a film of your life? It's already been done! No I'm joking but 'The Chef' has just come out, and people say Jon Favreau is a dead ringer for me...

Favourite things - apart from cooking? My beautiful fiancee Federica who worked with me at Pirelli and my motorbike.

Something people don't know about me: I'm a very good DJ.

Are you looking for a little escape away from Jersey, but don't want to stray too far from your own front door? Then why not pay a visit to the new kids on the island's coffee shop block, Dandy on Conway Street. The small but perfectly formed establishment, which opened its doors on August 4th, has taken up residence in the premises that used to house Flat Fee, the estate agents and before that a dog clothing shop, both businesses now operating purely online. Whilst it's new and shiny, it is also unassuming and already feels as though it's been on the street forever, despite only being open for around three months.

The difference between setting up in Jersey

Behind the discreet exterior awaits a fabulous and beautiful wood clad sanctuary that was born out of a shared love for quality coffee, good produce and sustainability. It's thanks to the union of Jamie Hooker and Dustin Moore, the co-owners of Dandy who met when Jerseyman Jamie left the island to travel to Australia back in 2005, that we're lucky enough to have this little taste of the southern hemisphere on our doorstep. Jamie's original trip, planned for just 12 months, saw him gravitate towards Sydney where he stayed until earlier this year and of course met Dustin!

via London came down to many things, Jamie credits his local support network with enabling them to get Dandy off the ground as quickly as they did, something they wouldn't have had in London. "Whilst we did a lot of the work ourselves we were really lucky to have had help from so many people. Charlie Dolan, a childhood friend of mine, he's an incredible furniture & cabinet designer-maker, he gets commissioned to make pieces, in fact he made the furniture in here. He helped us with the fit out of the shop, he showed us how to make the

If you're making your first visit to Dandy then be sure to sample the banana bread, it's already got a reputation for being some of the best around or for a savoury hit try Rich Howell's sourdough, featured in last months Genuine Jersey Articles, topped your choice of one of the following toppings: fresh tomato, free range smashed egg, house sliced prosciutto and avocado, or have it with a choice of spreads. Or there's the Cada, a non oat based museli made from shredded coconut, apple, dates and nuts served with fresh fruit, Jersey Dairy natural yoghurt, sweet dukkah & honey, it's

divine! These are just a sample of the treats that await you.

"We'd spent a long time thinking about moving back to the UK, we knew what we wanted to do, having been inspired by the fantastic coffee shops in Sydney and I wanted to be closer to home having been away for such a long time, although initially we were gravitating towards London. But then just before Christmas

my stepfather had a stroke, so we came back to help out my Mum and be with family. We only ever planned to stay for a couple of months, using Jersey as a base to set up and get our London plans started. After being here for a few weeks we realised what was involved in his recovery, so wanted to stay close and help out and then we found this place."

The Dandy boys offer a small, simple food menu, a fabulous people watching spot with seats for up to eight and then there's the coffee...which is 'thoroughly good'. They are already building up a firm following of regulars and you only need to visit their Facebook page to read any one of the excellent reviews to realise they've already achieved a great deal in the first three months they've been open.

wooden struts that line the walls and then we worked off his design, oh and used his tools, and did the rest ourselves, well actually Dustin did."

They serve Allpress coffee, a brand that began its life in New Zealand, and one that invests a lot of time looking for small farms, estates and co-ops that are sustainably managed. If you're really interested in coffee then ask the guys to explain all about the water filtration system they had to install in order to statisfy the very high standards set by Allpress. Sustainability is very much at the heart of everything the Dandy boys are doing, Dustin himself spent a year working on a sustainability project within a coffee farm in Panama, gaining valuable experience and insight, much of which motivates him today.

There are a great many things that separate Dandy from other establishments on the island, least of all their size, service, menu and the boys themselves, but so as not to appear totally biased I asked a friend what is it that makes Dandy her new go to, and I think she summed

it up perfectly "It's just everything, from the style, the service, the different food, the lovely smiles, the great coffee. It's just great!"

If you're a coffee lover pay the boys a visit, at peak times you may have to wait for a little while, these boys will accept nothing but the best for you, and if this means they have to pour your espresso shots more than once then they will, but trust me it really is worth the wait!

Oh and be sure to leave a tip, you'll see the bowl on the counter, but these aren't for the staff, they donate them to a different charity each month and are happy to consider your suggestions.

Dandy are open weekdays from 0630 and close around 1600.

THAI SPICED FISH SOUP

WITH BOK CHOY & CHILLI

WORDS MARTIN CZECHOWSKI

WAYSIDE CAFÉ



INGREDIENTS (SERVES 6)

3 tbsp vegetable oil
1 heaped tsp red curry paste
4 banana shallots peeled and thinly sliced
300ml chicken or veg stock
600ml coconut milk
2 tbsp lime juice
1 heaped tsp palm or muscavado sugar
1-2 tsp sea salt
300g raw peeled tiger prawns
700g white fish (bream, bass, monkfish)
4 tbsp chopped coriander
200g bok choi
To serve: Extra coriander and medium hot red chili

METHOD Heat the oil in a large saucepan over medium-low heat, add the curry paste and stir it around, then add the shallots and cook for a few minutes until they soften and are coated with the paste. Pour in the stock and coconut milk, and add the lime juice, sugar and salt. Bring to the boil and simmer over a very low heat for 15 minutes, stirring frequently, until the soup is creamy.


Cut the fish into 4cm pieces. Add the fish and prawns to the pan and bring back to the boil over high heat then maintain at a lively simmer for about 4 minutes, until the fish is firm and has lost its translucency, gently stir in the bok choi halfway through. Add the coriander and serve scattered with extra coriander, and if you wish a slice or two of chili.


Leaves are falling, the air has a definite chill to it and we're into that time of year that just makes you go brrrrr!

Ironic, really.

SAMSUNG GEAR VR (OCULUS)

For anyone that has read this feature in the past, you may be aware that I harbor a certain disdain for the new Samsung Galaxy Gear. It is simply a collection of grotesque watches that serve about as much purpose as a convertible submarine, or so I thought. With the help of Oculus, there is a new addition to the Galaxy Gear family that may just save the company from the wrath of scathing online reviews. This new addition is the Samsung Gear VR, Innovator Edition. This headset, although blinding you to the outside world and making you look like a rejected extra from AI: Alien Intelligence, is essentially witchcraft to those who don't understand the science of virtual reality, and let's be honest who does? 


The Innovator Edition is only the prototype essentially, and thus, as the company admits, there are still things to work out with this device, the features on it only being beta versions. However, in the future, I have absolutely no doubt these things will be the new Nintendo Wii, minus the shocking failures that came after the original. Unfortunately, after a back-breaking, eyeaching five minute search online, I found out these things will only be available within the next few weeks, and I can't even find a place to pre-order them. Just keep looking out online, because realistically this thing won't be making its way to the island any time soon.

VISIONSTATION VR DOME

There are gadgets out there in the world that raise serious questions, such as whether the world really ever needed the text-messaging chandelier, or whether Microsoft should just give up in its fight with the iPhone. However, the VisionStation VR Dome brings about certain musings on the subject of want vs. need. In fact, that is a lie, "need" is not one of the many things that go through anyone's mind when they see this product, unlike an intense desire to completely unjustifiably spend four years worth of wages on what is essentially a glorified wall. Hailed by its creators as "the future of virtual reality", the VisionStation is intended to be used for workers, reviewing building, automotive and aero designs, with a 2m display, which admittedly does boast a resolution of 1920 x 1080. However, realistically, we all know that the three people that actually fork out the \$24,500 for this will be aging, single and overweight gentlemen that will use it to show off to their couple friends, ironically only emphasizing their loneliness. It may also be found somewhere dark and quite private.

You read right unfortunately. This product, which really is just a projector and a piece of black plastic, costs \$24,500, roughly £15,000. Hardly seems worth it, especially when you consider that a HD television is a 15th of the price and doesn't portray and image of crippling isolation.

Needless to say, this product comes from a website on which there are more grammatical mistakes than there are hanging from the walls of Year 1 classrooms, but hey, the fun of virtual reality is virtually priceless (IT'S TOO EASY).

Unfortunately, and I'm becoming used to starting these final sentences with that, the Google Glass is not cheap. Just for the frames, it's \$1,500, and once again I am certain that this will be an "order online" job. However, who can put a price on a heads-up display of how to improve your drive?

If you're an Apple fan the chances are that the iPhone 6 is already on your Christmas list and nothing that I or anyone else says is going to change that.

Those of us who like the iPhone, but realise that there are other makes out there, may want a bit more information but for some the mere fact that Apple have brought out the latest version will be enough.

So what can I say? Yes it's the best iPhone so far and built brilliantly (as you'd expect). But I don't like the back with its plastic strips and the hump which makes the handset wobble when I put it down.

The front on the other hand looks great and its bigger brother, the 6+, looks even better. The display has been upgraded from the iPhone 5, yet the battery life is better too, so it has better features for longer.

The speakers and video player are okay, but the camera and video recorder are fantastic. The iOS 8 means that there are extra features, but I noticed that it didn't have an FM radio. I guess that iPhones come under such scrutiny that things like that will get noticed, even if they're minor or fixable.

The iPhone 6, and 6+, compare pretty well to the competition but they don't blow everything else out the water. Yes, they're fast and they have an apple on them, but if you want more features on your phone then you might look elsewhere.

I'd pop in to Airtel-Vodafone and actually pick up one of these, a competitor, and talk about which is better for you. However, I suspect that there will still be a lot of people who will be disappointed if they unwrap anything else on 25 December.





Skills Accelerator grants provide support to employees of local businesses (SMEs) to access training that will make a difference to the viability or diversification of their employer's business. Grants could support personal development, vocational or specialist training, and training for employees looking to progress to a new role.

Successful applicants are offered a grant of up to 75% of the total balance of their training costs, up to £4,000.
